



## **Irene Elly Savitsky**

Irene Elly Savitsky is the Vice President of the International Tax and Investment Center (ITIC) in Washington D.C.

Ms. Savitsky oversees ITIC programmatic activities worldwide. Since joining ITIC in 1998, she organized and managed ITIC's programs in over 60 countries around the world. These programs bring senior finance, taxation, customs, and parliamentary officials together with representatives of international organizations, multinational companies, leading universities and private consultants. She is also in charge of ITIC's printed publications production and editorial of ITIC monthly Bulletin.

Ms. Savitsky also responsible for operative management of all ITIC offices and their finances, including budgeting, accounting, and reporting. She managed to reduce substantially costs and improve efficiency of ITIC practices.

Prior to ITIC, Ms. Savitsky was Executive Director and Program Manager for the Kriebel Institute, Washington D.C. (1995–1997). The mission of the Kriebel Institute was to assist emerging countries of the Former Soviet Union in their transition to democracy and free market via direct political and economic training of senior government officials and business leaders (of large, medium and small enterprises) of these countries. Ms. Savitsky organized numerous high-profile events, and supervised over 40 field representatives in Eastern and Central Europe, managing over 100 in-country programs during three years.

Before relocation to the USA, Ms. Savitsky was Head of the English Department at the Institute of Management in Ukraine (1992–1994).

Ms. Savitsky completed core coursework of the MBA program at the George Washington University in Washington D.C. She received a Master of Arts (with honors) with a concentration in both English and German languages from the Ivano-Frankivsk State University, and accomplished Post Graduate study at the Kiev Institute of Foreign Languages in Ukraine.

Ms. Savitsky is a U.S. Citizen. She lives with her husband Alexander and son Leo in Arlington, Virginia.
